This summer, I had the pleasure of attending the Interstate Environmental Health Seminar near Beckley, West Virginia. Started in 1941, this Seminar is hosted on a rotating basis by Maryland, West Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama. You'll notice that Virginia is missing from that list; but thanks to the initiative of Board Delegate Jessica Stewart, VEHA has been welcomed to their planning committee and we look forward to hosting this multi-state, multi-day event in the mid 2020's.

VEHA Vice President for Professional Advancement Rachel Stradling also attended the seminar, and the two of us got to catch up with NEHA Region 8 Vice President James Speckhart and former NEHA President Bob Custard, who was a speaker. West Virginia Governor Jim Justice and the West Virginia State Health Commissioner Dr. Rahul Gupta addressed the group.
